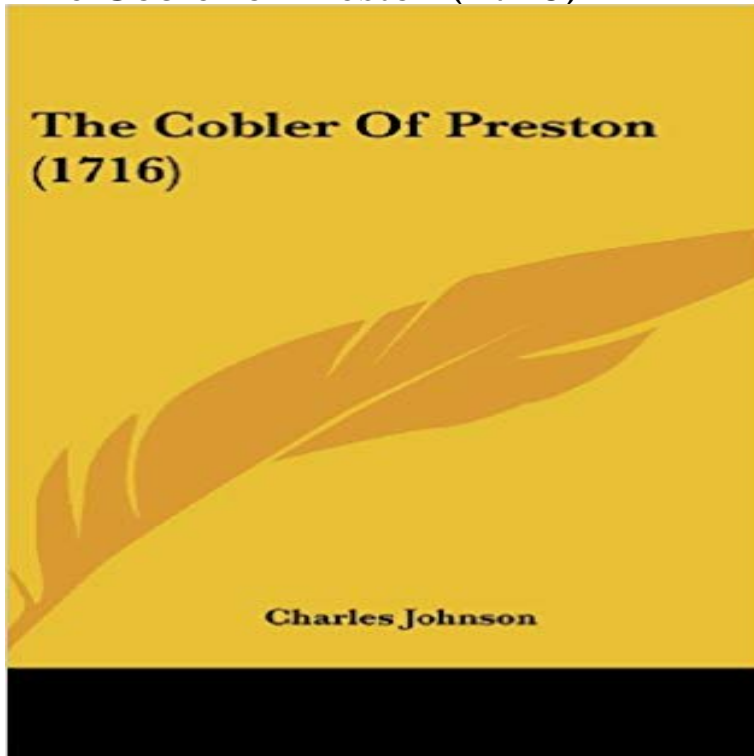


The Cobler of Preston (1716)
